harvests on the Reban farm were often made lighter as there was a regular contingent of retirees eager to try their hand at the harvest once again; these were some of John's favourite times. He loved to sing his Lord's praises and often had a word of encouragement to offer before he led the congregation in prayer. John served as a deacon, was an elder for many years, and it was John's faith that carried him as his health began to fail him this last while.

Several years ago, the family began to notice changes in John's habits and health which lead him to be diagnosed with progressive supranuclear palsy in early 2019.



On the evening of December 9, 2020 at Rosthern, Saskatchewan, our beloved husband, father and grandfather, John Ronald Reban peacefully left us for his Heavenly Home as Josephine, his wife of 56 years sat by his side. He celebrated his 81st birthday this past fall while residing at the Rosthern Mennonite Nursing Home.

John was born on September 23, 1939 to Paul and Mildred Reban (nee Postnikoff) on the family homestead at Petrofka, Saskatchewan close to where his parents were born. He was the fourth of six siblings and the oldest son. John spent his early childhood years on the family farm at Petrofka, happily occupied and often in the company of the family farmhand, Stanislaw Branecki who would remain a lifetime friend; it was here that he developed a lifelong love of farming. John's early school education began at the Petrofka schoolhouse under the tutelage of his cousin, Pauline Cheveldayoff (nee Reban) and continued at the Blaine Lake Composite High School after his family moved to Blaine Lake in 1953. John worked in various occupations throughout Saskatchewan and Alberta, often in construction including building the Petrofka bridge, before returning to farm fulltime in 1963.

It was at Blaine Lake that John met and married a young schoolteacher named Josephine Fox. On Christmas Eve 1970, they moved out to their home overlooking the North Saskatchewan River valley at beautiful Petrofka where together they would raise a family of five children and continue to build their farming life.

Throughout his farming career, John kept up with land sustaining practices in grain farming and rotational grazing pastures for the beef production, recognizing early on the importance of preserving the land to sustain a legacy farm. The mid-1980s saw John diversify as he started a wood slashing business and developed the Reban Wood Products company. He also had an interest in local politics and spent a term as Reeve for the R.M. of Blaine Lake.

Central to John's life was his faith in the Lord and his fellowship at the Gruenthal Church from which he gleaned many dear friends. Busy
