

Life Story

Henry was born to John and Cornelia (Fast) Block on February 3, 1926 in Orenburg, Russia; he was the seventh child in his family. This was a turbulent time in Russia involving persecution of Christians by the communist government which led his family to flee to Canada in 1926. They came to live with a family in rural Manitoba for two years before departing for southern Saskatchewan at the dawn of the Great Depression. Their family endured six years of drought before relocating to a Mennonite settlement in Waldheim, Saskatchewan. Though there was no church in Waldheim, they met with the other families each Sunday for biblical instruction and fellowship. Life was not easy but as Henry recalled, they were happy. They relied on God, and believed in the importance of prayer and devotion. These would continue to be the pillars on which Henry lived his life.

Henry worked on the farm as a Conscientious Objector until the end of the war in May of 1945. He then set out to pursue a career as a doctor. With no money to speak of, it was through God's faithfulness and the generosity of others that Henry completed his education. During this time Henry took on a summer job with the Dominion Forest Service as part of a research program in the Riding Mountain National Park in Manitoba. This experience would later prove to be the beginning of Henry's passion for life in the great outdoors.

Upon completing his 12 month internship, Henry was considered a finished, trained medical doctor and would later go on to become Chief of Pathology at City Hospital in Saskatoon where he remained until his retirement in June of 1990.
